CONTINUING THE LEGACY

Living Earth Center (LEC) was founded as The Center for Earth Spirituality and Rural Ministry (CESRM) by the School Sisters of Notre Danie (SSND) in 1996. For 29+ years, under the sole support of SSND, our primary focus was based on the social justice Daring those years, we ran the Community social justice Daring those years, we ran the Community Garden, offered workshops and classes on sustainability, and operated an advocacy network focused on local, grassroots efforts.

As the Sisters aged and their numbers began to decline, they asked CESRM to become an independent 501c3 to continue their legacy. We changed our name to Living Earth Center in 2017, when we became an independent nonprofit. While we continue to earry out and honor the School Sisters' legacy, we are not a religiously-affiliated nonprofit.



While continuing the focus on education and environmental and social justice, our efforts have also shifted to creating Community Growing Spaces in both the literal and figurative sense. We are dedicated to growing healthy communities by cultivating food and relationships through sharing common ground. We expanded this capability in 2021 when we took over manascener of the Blue Earth Count's Farm.

Living Earth Center's vision is to address food insecurity, land access, and community building through a semi-urban and rural approach. Finding new in-town locations for our Community Garden will ensure uses of access for ungardeners. Finding a larger rural passec to be home for our Living Earth Center Campus affords the acreage to grow both the Interneging Growers and Patture Pult Donation programs. As we begin to grow something new, we have the ability to work with community partners to crivision and build a space that this specific needs and fills gaps that exist for our local community. LIVING EARTH CENTER RURAL CAMPUS

This location will be a larger (10+ acres) incubator agriculture space. It will include aspects of community supported agriculture, Produce Domation Program, education and community building. Following an incubator model, it will provide emerging or small growers exclusive and affortable access to parcels of land, training and support with the goal of introducing them or providing access points to the local food economy.

Additionally, the space will encompass aspects of community art, music, educational workshops, and interactive events. The Campus will be a community-wide engagine space, onen to other nonrofits and organizations to utilize.

NEW COMMUNITY GARDEN

Living Earth Center will manage 2-3 smaller (1 acre or less) community garden spaces spread throughout the city. These gardens would replace LEC's single Community Garden currently in operation on Good Counsel Hill.

The new gardens will provide community members access to small parcels of land to grow food for themselves and their families. Until the LEC Campus property is identified and operational, these gardens would also be home to our Community Garden Partnership Programs, hosting groups like MNSU's College of Health and Nursing's dementia-friendly Engles AGE-ment garden, and to our Youth Garden, AGE-ment garden, and to our Youth Garden MNSU's MNSU's property of the Campus property is ready we envision moving these more more more to uncertail location.



These community growing spaces would allow people to come together to connect in addition to cultivating healthy food for individuals and families. Target areas could be unused lots or spaces in "high impact" areas with lower incomes and more food security needs.
